THE UPPER HALF: Upper Halver, George Reight 633-1202
With the passing of summer haze and at long last the appearance of good observing skies perhaps we should review a few courtesies that apply to our visits to the Barber Observatory.
First of all, if you arrive after dark, be sure to TURN OFF your CAR LIGHTS before entering the gate. Astrophotography is probably in progress and your car lights will cause unwanted special effects on film, which will explain why the photographer cut 6" from one of your tripod legs.
If you are the last one to leave the observatory area, be sure to lock both the observatory and warmup shed, pickup your litter and PULL THE MASTER SWITCH to OFF on the pole and be sure to lock the gate. Failure to do this will result in being forced to take the entire AAC to Nikoli's Roof for lunch. (No excuses or substitutions)

This Months UPPER HALF is written by Dr. Eugene Powell, an active member of the AAC since 1969.

Gene has served as a member of the Board of Directors, Steering Committee, program director, treasurer and president. He has also been the featured speaker at several of meetings. His most recent lecture was on specialized photography. He is also a recent winner of the M-Club plaque award.

Gene currently has a teaching career along with the responsibilities of a research engineer in the Department of Aerospace Engineering at Georgia Tech. He writes:

Do not be discouraged from observing Halley's comet from bright city skies if it is inconvenient to reach a dark observing site. During September and October when the comet was in the morning sky, I observed it three times from my home just five miles east of downtown Atlanta. Using a 10-inch f4.5 Dobsonian telescope at 190X I first saw Halley's comet on the morning of September 16 as a small faint 12.5 magnitude smudge of light. A Lumicon Deep Sky Filter enhanced it only slightly. Three and a half weeks later on the morning of October 11, Comet Halley was much brighter, appearing like a medium size planetary nebula with a faint starlike nucleus. At this time the comet was about 1.7 A.U. from the earth and 2.2 A.U. from the sun. I saw it last on the morning of October 20 as an 11th magnitude fuzzy round coma without tail. During November, Halley's comet is expected to reach 7th magnitude and will pass close to the Pleiades at midmonth. If you can't get out to Villa Rica, don't hesitate to set up your telescope in you own backyard. You might be surprized at how much you will see.

Comet Halley presents an unparalled opportunity to get more people interested in astronomy and to enlist new members in the Atlanta Astronomy Club. Also there will be numerous public observing outings sponsered by schools and other organizations in which AAC members may volunteer their services. One such opportunity will occur on Friday, December 6 at Morningside Elementary School in Atlanta. Several telescopes are needed to show the comet to roughly 200 first through fifth graders, and their parents. If you are interested in bringing your telescope and helping in this event, please contact me or my wife, Judy at 872-0891.
